

Laps From The Past, or Marque-In-Time

50 Laps Ago: October '63 Bob Morse called the meeting to order in the conference room at Alan Green Chevrolet, where 30 members were present. Nancy Mitchell offered to fill in as temporary Secretary. Bill Trippett gave the current finances of the club. He noted the only outstanding bill being the fee for the attorney that handled the Incorporation legal paperwork for filling to the state as an official, not for profit sports car club. The subject of club jackets and car badges were discussed, and a number of illustrations drawn by Phyllis Baker were examined.



The members in attendance voted on two of her designs for consideration as the club's logo for the badges. The subject was then tabled until the November meeting as other's noted additional drawings were soon forthcoming from other members. George Green was present with a sample of a white knit jacket available to the membership. The price per jacket was \$10, with Alan Green Chevrolet picking up half that in supporting the club. Those present agreed to take a final vote on the matter in November, and to see what sizes were available for both men & women. The new point system was agreed by all present to be addressed and voted upon at the next meeting. Dick Stanley presented the printing costs of Club identification cards: 500 for \$15, plus an additional \$5 with the club emblem. A motion presented by Mo Morse and seconded by Ron Peters noted the following message be printed on the ID cards: "Corvette Marque Club of Seattle, Inc. If you're proud of your Corvette and would like to meet with this same pride, contact the 'Corvette Marque Club' by calling: (Name, phone, comments)." The motion passed. Those going to the Laguna SECA Race will tour with Sue Stanley. Several suggestions for a heading and titles for the newsletter by Phyllis Baker would be used until one was chosen to be the permanent one. The newsletter will be typed on Master Dittos by Nancy Mitchell and run off by Mo Morse, with the materials provided by Sadie Ramsfield (a truly cooperative venture by the membership to make something happen for the good of the club- Ben). It was suggested that a register be available for the members to sign in at each meeting so a record of attendance could be kept.

40 Laps Ago: October'73 The monthly meeting took place following dinner at the Spaghetti Barn in Kent. The WWSCC rep. stated that many rule changes will be addressed at the next meeting. Tom Marzullo read the selection of

nominations to be considered for the upcoming NWACC officer's election. Club activity highlights included a tune up session at Bill Hazelett Chevrolet, a practice session at SIR, and, the Halloween Party at Kelly's. Jeff (no last name mentioned) gave a report on the procedure of the practice session, and, Rick Stark will head the session. Kevin (no last name mentioned) reported that Bill Phillie will speak at the next meeting on rallying; the next event is scheduled for next month with the Northwest Rallye Club. Kevin showed a picture of the winter ski jacket for members to purchase, but it is not an official club jacket; cost being \$17.50 each. Jim Chambers was to be voted into membership, but a question about eligibility arose since he has not attended a club sponsored event: it was tabled to be examined at a later date. Ray Bigulow and Bob Gould spoke on Gabriel Shocks and showed a movie and answered questions. A State House Bill was read to the members in attendance; no person shall be permitted to license for use on the public highways of this state any motor vehicles having a displacement of weight ratio of less than 9.0 to one. A surcharge will be assessed for each calendar year for any over or under (was it really both over and under) this standard; to be voted upon in January.

30 Laps Ago: October'83 The monthly meeting was called to order by VP Jay Cockrum at the Mandarin Banquet Family Dinner in Lynnwood, in lieu of the president not being available. The Treasurer noted a good return for the club's finances from the recent Drag Race/Swap Meet. NCAA rep noted the \$10 assessment was approved by the membership, and lists of names were noted of those running for the upcoming officers' election. Their Awards Banquet was slated to be held at the Iron Gate Restaurant in Puyallup and hosted by Classical Glass of Tacoma. Membership noted the balance at 139 with no prospective at the moment. Club event highlights were a practice session (Corvette Only) at SIR, and the annual Halloween Party at the home of Don & Nina Gord. Frank Olsheski submitted his registration as Secretary, anyone wishing to fill in, please contact the Board.

20 Laps Ago: October'93 The monthly meeting was called to order by President Dee Esping at the home of John Thomas, and Bob Lazaroff filled in as Secretary for Sandra Greene. Noted; since the meeting served a dual purpose as a "ground school" for the upcoming Wine Country Tour, as the "tasting" had already commenced; the accuracy of the following minutes may become suspect. Membership noted Dick & Jane Shimanek were accepted into full membership, even after he used the "F-word" (Ford), to bring the total to 108. Jan Cockrum reported that there were 121 people and 46 cars in attendance, with 22 membership applications and newsletters given out at the 30th Anniversary Party. Commemorative t-shirts and wine glasses were available for purchase. Cloyd Jackson and Bob Lazaroff were to co-produce the November newsletter. Cece

Nelson was looking into purchasing Nutcracker Theater tickets for the upcoming holiday season for the club to attend as a group in November. NWACC held their banquet on the $23^{\rm rd}$. Issues: CMCS will donate \$50 for door prizes, and, will rejoin for another \$50. Dee was trying to contact the NCCC rep for a meeting in January about the benefits of joining them. Loren & Verleen announced their engagement; their wedding was planned at the end of January. Club events highlighted were the overnight Wine Tour of Yakima Valley and a Tour to Mt. Baker with the Majestic Class CC hosting.

10 Laps Ago: October'03 Cloyd & Barbara Jackson's 1999 C5 Torch Red convertible was featured on the newsletter cover. President Dennis Montgomery got the monthly meeting started at the Longhorn BBQ in Auburn. Thanks to Ed & Sharon Bloom & the Longhorn for the space provided for our meeting. TOUR TIPS

NE OF THE things CMCS members love to do is go on tours. These can be day tours or "overnighters" like the Wine Tour and Wet Weekend. We are fortunate enough to have a good number of new members, and some may like to know



what to do and look for in a tour.

This is not meant to be a "RULES OF THE ROAD" item, but rather just some thoughts on how to make tours more enjoyable and less stressful for all.

It's not the end of the world if a non-Corvette gets into our caravan lane.

Too often, it is easy to tailgate, speed up, slow down or perform some other less-than-safe maneuver in order to make sure that a steel car doesn't get in line. It just doesn't matter! In fact, it may be the biggest thrill the steel car driver will have all day by being in line with all those beautiful Corvettes! Sooner or later (usually sooner) the steel car will change lanes, turn off, or just vaporize, and we'll all be back together.

Learn to pass correctly in a caravan, on the freeway or otherwise.

On a freeway, it is very dangerous to try to pass someone and then squeeze back in line too soon with the other Corvettes. When you are passing and try to get back in line or get "hung out," or a turn-off or exit is coming up, learn to leap-frog ahead of the Corvette just ahead of the passed vehicle. If the Corvette you want to get behind has slowed down (this happens all too often after passing; don't be guilty of doing this!) keep going past the next Corvette(s) until to you can safely merge back into line. It is very important that we all learn this and pay attention with what's happening behind us. If we see another Corvette that wants to get back in line, safely allow a space for them AHEAD of you so they can get back in line easily. This leap-frog maneuver will take all the stress and most of the danger out of passing, and is a great example of teamwork.

If you don't have a radio that works with the club's frequencies...GET ONE!

The radio allows you to relax and enjoy the drive because you are in touch with the tour leaders and others on the tour. Therefore you stand a significantly less chance of getting lost (a thoroughly not-fun experience on a tour) because you know what's coming next and what may have changed. It is also really nice to have something pointed out that might have been missed, such as bicyclists, wildlife, landmarks, Mustangs broken down on the side of the road and other items of interest. In addition, there are some pretty clever people out there who can provide some entertaining comments over the radio, too.

We all need to know that use of the radio implies taking on some responsibility. We have to be sure to use them as if our kids were listening (or even worse, our parents!) and not use profanity, off-color jokes/comments, blaring music from your Corvette's speakers, endless monologues or anything else that would be inappropriate to other members.

Remember, you bought your radio to help make the use of your Corvette more pleasant, so use your radio and have fun with it!

Make sure the Corvette behind you knows where to turn.

If you make a scheduled turn and the Corvette behind you is too far back to see you make that turn, they may miss it. The best way to make sure no one gets lost is to take a turn and wait until the Corvette behind you sees you before you proceed. If everyone did this, no one would get lost because you would be "watching out" for the Corvette behind you and the Corvette ahead would be 'watching out" for you!

I hope this has been informative, and remember: have fun on those tours! That's why you bought that beautiful Corvette! ❖

CMCS Radio Tips

OW THAT WE are in the cruising/parade/tour season, we offer the following tips for the use of club radios. Most of us have them and we all realize what a great tool they are to help make club events and activities more fun and less stressful. So we thought the following would help.

First, hold the radio the right distance from your mouth. There is a natural tendency to hold the radio close to our mouths because we think it will help others hear us better. Actually, holding the radio too close is the main reason a lot of us are not understood. The recommended distance is three inches from mouth to radio, but that

should be treated as a minimum. A distance of four inches makes it much easier to be understood.

Second, be careful using the transmit button. A lot of us start talking before the button is fully depressed and the first part of what we say is lost. The best way to handle this is to press the transmit button, wait a second, and <u>then</u> start talking. The same is true when finishing our transmittal. We need to finish what we have to say and then wait a second to release to button. If we all follow this procedure we will not have any part of our "pearls of wisdom" fail to be transmitted.

Third, we must be aware of how loudly we are talking when we transmit. It is natural to speak in a louder voice than normal to make sure we are heard, but the radios we have—be they old or new—are very efficient. Loud talking or yelling is just not needed. Believe me, if we are not talking loud enough to be heard, someone will tell us!

Fourth, let's all try to be "tuned in" to radio usage. If we hear someone who is hard to understand, we should let them know (in a nice way) so we can get used to correct usage.

Fifth, use your radio to alert others to such things as bicyclists on the road, potholes, road hazards, police presence, errors in directions, etc.

Last, use your radio to make your club activities more enjoyable for yourself and others. While the radio's main purpose is to be used for safety and convenience, feel free to use it for those things which may make the tour or event more enjoyable for others. Such things might be to alert others to see certain landmarks, animal life, views etc. While dominating all radio usage is not a good way to go, the radio is your property. So, using common sense as your guide, have fun with your radio! •
